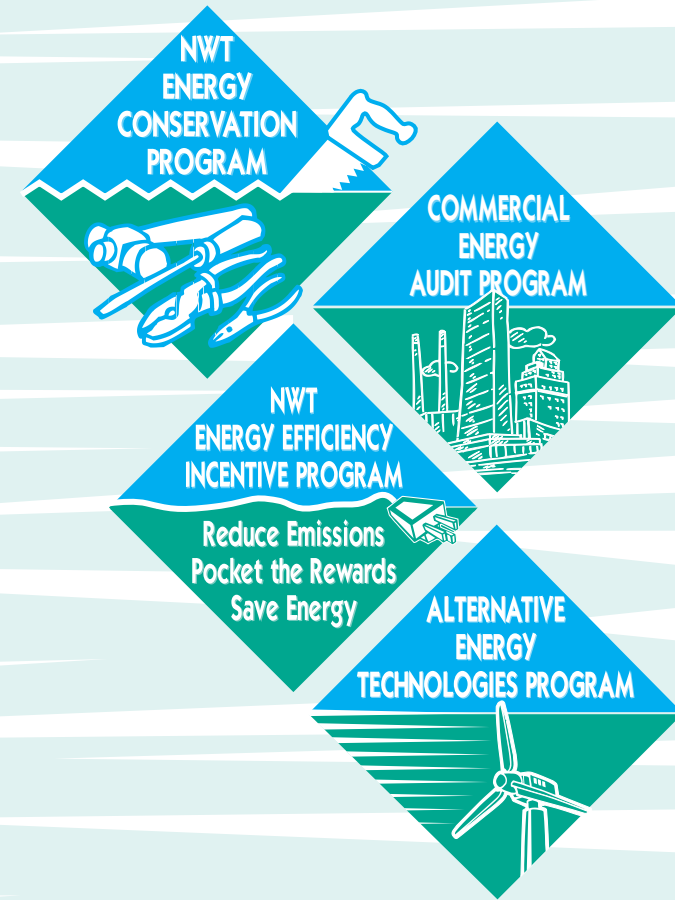

Four Ways to Energy Savings!



Northwest
Territories

The Government of the Northwest Territories is committed to reducing greenhouse gas emissions and assisting residents with the high cost of energy. Four programs, developed under the NWT Greenhouse Gas Strategy and the NWT Energy Plan, are helping Northwest Territories (NWT) residents, businesses and communities save energy, reduce emissions of greenhouse gases and other air pollutants, and save money.

Energy Efficiency Incentive Program — For residents, businesses and non-profit organizations

The Energy Efficiency Incentive Program (EEIP) helps homeowners, businesses and non-profit organizations purchase new, more energy efficient models of products they use every day. Rebate categories include home appliances, heating appliances, vehicles, outboard motors, snowmobiles and home renovation products.

Purchase an eligible product from a participating NWT dealer. By completing the application form and attaching a copy of the sales receipt you can get a rebate of \$100 to \$2,000. EEIP is administered through the Arctic Energy Alliance. For more information check their web site at www.aea.nt.ca.

Energy Conservation Program — For communities, Aboriginal governments and non-profits

Got an idea for an energy or water-saving project that will save the community money and reduce air emissions? Looking for help with funding? Then look this way.

The Energy Conservation Program (ECP) is designed to help community-funded departments, boards and agencies, Aboriginal governments and non-profit organizations use the water and energy resources of the NWT more efficiently.

Some of the ways your community organization can access funding from ECP include:

- install or upgrade energy efficient heating or lighting equipment;
- install low flow toilets and other water saving devices; or
- be creative. If you have an idea that you think will save your community energy or water dollars call Environment and Natural Resources.

Your community organization can access up to \$50,000 for any one project by preparing a proposal. Guidelines for ECP are available at www.enr.gov.nt.ca.

Commercial Energy Audit Program — For businesses

The Commercial Energy Audit Program (CEAP) is designed to ensure businesses have access to affordable energy audits for use in making informed decisions on building and efficiency upgrades to reduce energy consumption and costs.

All NWT businesses that own or rent property for the purpose of doing business are eligible for this program.

To defray the high cost of travel in the NWT the fund has been structured to cover:

- up to 70% of total audit costs in Yellowknife;
- up to 90% of total audit costs in all other communities; and
- maximum GNWT contribution is \$7,000

With a completed energy audit, businesses can apply for the Government of Canada's *ecoENERGY Retrofit Incentive for Buildings*, which provides financial incentives for small and medium-sized businesses to undertake energy-saving improvements.

Alternative Energy Technologies Program

Alternative energies, such as solar, wind and biomass, provide energy using no fossil fuels and no pollutants. With the high costs of energy in the NWT, some of these alternatives make economic sense. The Alternative Energy Technologies Program (AETP) has two funding categories: one for demonstration projects and another for small-scale installations. Community Renewable Energy Fund — For communities, Aboriginal governments, non-profits and GNWT departments

The Community Renewable Energy Fund (CREF) provides assistance to test promising technologies in the NWT to prove they will work here. CREF promotes projects that advance the knowledge and effectiveness of new clean energy technologies in the NWT.

Matching grants of up to \$50,000 per year are available for eligible projects. If you have an idea to generate energy using no fossil fuels, contact Environment and Natural Resources.

Small Renewable Energy Fund — For residents and businesses

The Small Renewable Energy Fund (SREF) is available to residential homeowners and commercial businesses wishing to use clean energy technologies in their homes or businesses. Technologies eligible for funding include solar photovoltaic systems, wind turbines and ground source heat pumps.

Grants of up to a third of eligible costs, to a maximum of \$5,000 per year, are available through a simple application form. Contact Environment and Natural Resources or download the form at www.enr.gov.nt.ca.
