
BOREAL CARIBOU RANGE PLANNING


Boreal caribou habitat NEEDS



Large, continuous, connected forest and muskeg habitats




Space to avoid predators like wolves


Boreal caribou are known by many names in different Indigenous languages:

Tłicho: todzi **South Slavey:** mbedzih or medzih North Slavey: gop'í gotodzi or deshjwánéné todzí

Enhanced Disturbed areas should

- be used if possible for new developments.
- Any new disturbances are to be restored.
- Forests are somewhat protected from fire.
- More needed by caribou.


Intensive

- Disturbed areas must be used for new developments.
- · Higher levels of restoration are required.
- Key forest areas are protected from fire.
- Most needed by caribou.





Intense wildfires, development or land clearing remove old forests that are important for caribou



Young forests may support more moose, which then brings more predators



Roads and cutlines allow predators to travel faster and access remote habitats

As we create and carry out range plans, the Government of Northwest Territories will work with its partners to monitor boreal caribou. Over time, the way boreal caribou respond
