

Water Stewardship in the Northwest Territories

NWT residents have a strong relationship with water. Clean and abundant water is essential to ecosystem health and the social, cultural and economic well-being of NWT residents. Many people draw spiritual and cultural strength from the land and water. We drink water to stay healthy – both groundwater and surface water. We eat and use plants, fish and other animals that rely on water. We depend on water for our economy, including fur harvesting and fishing. Rivers are a source of energy to generate electrical power. We use water to travel and transport goods during the summer and winter. We all have a responsibility to care for the land and water. Our use of the water and land must not harm the water and aquatic ecosystems on which people, plants and animals depend. This responsibility is called *water stewardship*.

The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) supports and promotes the implementation of *Northern Voices, Northern Waters: NWT Water Stewardship Strategy* (Water Strategy). The Water Strategy was released in 2010 and has a vision that "the waters of the Northwest Territories will remain clean, abundant and productive for all time". The GNWT is committed to working with water partners to achieve this vision. Many activities and programs contribute to this vision, including negotiating transboundary water agreements, community-based water quality monitoring, regulatory reporting and water stewardship education.

Water partners are anyone with a role in water stewardship. This includes Aboriginal, territorial and federal governments, Aboriginal organizations, communities, regulatory boards, non-government organizations, industry and academic institutions.

Youth and water stewardship

During development of the Water Strategy, water partners emphasized the importance of involving young people in water stewardship. Youth are the future leaders of our territory. Opportunities for youth to learn about water stewardship and participate in water stewardship activities create informed leaders and decision-makers of tomorrow.

This calendar lists opportunities for young people to explore water stewardship activities and programming in the NWT. Each month highlights different ways for youth to get involved! More detailed information about each program is available at the back of the calendar.

What does water mean to you and your community?

NWT youth were invited to participate in a Water Stewardship Youth Photo Contest. Youth were encouraged to submit photos and descriptions that captured what water means to them and their community.

More than 50 spectacular water-themed photos and captions were submitted from youth across the NWT!

The photos were displayed at the annual Water Strategy Implementation Workshop in Dettah in November 2016. More than 75 water partners from across the NWT and beyond browsed the powerful collection of photos and voted to choose the final contest winners. After a very close vote, two final prize winners were selected.

Congratulations to Deanna O'Reilly of Fort Resolution and Madison Melnyk of Norman Wells on their winning photos! These photos, along with many others from the collection, are featured throughout the calendar.

The Great Canadian Shoreline Cleanup is a national initiative led by the World Wildlife Fund and the Vancouver Aquarium. Every year, thousands of Canadian youth participate in shoreline cleanup events across the country, tracking and recording the trash they find along the way. In the NWT, shoreline cleanups are often organized in the spring and fall by schools, community organizations, youth groups and governments. Tłįcho Summer Student Research Assistant Program

The Tłįchǫ Summer Student Research Assistant Program is an exciting opportunity for Tłįchǫ youth to gain valuable work experience related to climate change in the north. Youth have the chance to work alongside university researchers at the Tundra Ecosystem Research Station at Daring Lake in July or August. The Dehcho Youth Ecology Camp is held every summer (usually August) at a different location in the Dehcho Region. The camp is led by Dehcho First Nations and provides fun opportunities for youth to connect with and learn about northern ecosystems, including water ecology, water contaminants, water stewardship and environmental impacts on fish. The camp promotes a better understanding of Dene cultural and land-based knowledge systems as well as western science methods. Tłįcho Aquatic Ecosystem Monitoring Program

The Tłįchǫ Aquatic Ecosystem Monitoring Program is a community-driven project aimed at addressing water quality and fish health concerns raised by Tłįchǫ people. Every summer (usually early September) the project team conducts an on-the-land fish camp that rotates to a different Tłįchǫ community each year. The camp is a great hands-on learning opportunity for Tłįchǫ youth to connect with Elders and gain experience in conducting aquatic monitoring research, including the collection of fish and water samples, and making observations using both Tłįchǫ and scientific knowledge. Every other summer Ecology North hosts a Young Leader's Summit on Climate Change. The summit is a fun opportunity for youth across the three territories to learn more about the impacts of climate change, and discuss creative adaptations and solutions. During the 2015 Summit, participants travelled through the southern NWT speaking to Elders, scientists, community members and politicians about the severity of northern climate change impacts. 
